None of this would have been possible if I didn't have the continued support of the Thomas Gainsborough Sixth Form team.




# WILL KENNEDY, LAW

Last year I applied to the Foreign and Commonwealth Office and I now currently work as a diplomat at the UK Permanent Representation to the EU, in Brussels.




# CALLUM FULLER, DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANT (ART)

**R**ebecca Goss grew up in Suffolk and was a pupil at Great Cornard Upper School from 1987 to 1992.

Whilst still at school she won the W H Smith Young Writers' Competition, judged by Ted Hughes. She went on to study English Literature at Liverpool John Moores University. She has an MA in Creative Writing from Cardiff University, and is currently studying for a PhD in Publication at the University of East Anglia.

Her first full-length collection of poetry, *The Anatomy of Structures*, was published in 2010

by Flambard Press. Her second collection *Her Birth* (Carc Janet/Northern House, 2013) was shortlisted for The Forward Prize for Best Collection 2013, The Warwick Prize for Writing 2015 and The Portico Prize for Literature 2015. It won the poetry category in the East Anglian Book Awards in 2013. I went to TGS Sixth Form to study Law, History, Spanish and English Language for my A Levels (and an additional GCSE at the same time!).

I got A B B at A2 level with 3 other AS levels. I only got a 'C' at AS level in Law. I moved to Liverpool to study Law at University. I got a First class degree with honours and was in the top 6% in my University. It just goes to show your A-Levels don't always reflect how you will do at university.

You can also be a Solicitor Apprentice now for 6 years after finishing A-Levels and qualify as a Solicitor without going to university etc.

After leaving university, I studied the Legal Practitioners Course and completed my Masters in Science in Law, Business and Management. In my final year I got a job in a law firm and having worked very hard there for a year they awarded me a training contract, the final step to becoming a solicitor (via the traditional route).

I qualify as a Solicitor in September (2019) after several years of studying at Sixth Form/ University/Masters etc.

# DANIEL SWAIN, ENGINEERING PRODUCT MANAGER

**M**y Sixth Form subjects were:

- Product Design (Grade C)
- Physics (Grade C)
- Maths (Grade B)

After Sixth Form I applied for a Technical Engineering Apprenticeship at Delphi, that involved studying a Foundation Degree in Mechanical Engineering part time and an NVQ Level 3 in Engineering Technical Support. I didn't get the job to begin with as they said I didn't have enough practical experience! I only ended up getting it when one applicant turned the job down. Just goes to show that you can still succeed if at first you fail!

During my time as an apprentice I was named in the top 3 apprentices in the country in 2014 at the National Apprenticeship Awards and was named the 2015 'Institute of Mechanical Engineers' Apprentice of the Year. My Apprentice activities/duties at work included:

- Multi Departmental Placements – Tool Making, Production, Engineering, Quality, Computer Aided Design

- Chairing the Apprentice Association – Organising charity events and educational trips, developing careers events material.
- Tutoring fellow apprentices – My studies in Maths and Physics significantly helped in this area!

Once I Completed my 4 year apprenticeship and Foundation Degree I began studying for my Bachelor's Degree in Engineering, whilst being a Graduate Manufacturing Systems Engineer at Delphi working in the Assembly and Test Department. I spent 12 months in this role before progressing into a Production Management position, being responsible for 50+ employees across 3 shifts. 18 months later I then took the role of Engineering Lead in the Projects Department, being responsible for the successful transfer of Production Equipment from Sudbury to Romania.

I now have a 1st class honours degree in Engineering and most recently achieved a Level 5 Leadership and Management qualification from Colchester Institute (studying part time). I have also been lucky enough to travel on business duties to countries such as Poland, Germany, Luxembourg and Romania.



The skills acquired during my time at Thomas Gainsborough Sixth Form have carried me far beyond simply completing the exams and collecting the results, and I found my two years to be especially enjoyable.



## Katharine Rose

I am currently studying a History degree at Glasgow University and I am hoping to go into Law or the probation service after university. A Levels are difficult and I think the best thing to help you get through that is to feel as comfortable and supported as possible. With the help and support of the staff I went on to achieve A\*A\*AA in my A-Levels and I am currently studying Maths at Durham University. The teachers were extremely supportive and approachable, they wanted me to succeed and so pushed me to do my best. In addition, the smaller class sizes made me feel cared about and valued as an individual, and the work set was suited to all levels. # James Bacon

I studied Biology, Chemistry and Geography at A Level during my time at TGS, and these together sparked my scientific interest in how the Earth system operates as a whole from a physical standpoint. I graduated from TGS in 2014. I went on to study BSc Geography at Durham University, which quite literally took me around the world and allowed me to catch a glimpse of just how deep the discipline really is, solidifying my fascination with the science and fortified my desire to continue learning.

After securing a first-class undergraduate degree, I continued my journey to the University of Birmingham where I studied a Masters in Meteorology to the same result, and have since developed (over the course of two dissertations) a specific interest in how interannual modes of climate variability are resolved in the models we use to forecast and predict our weather and climate.

Since graduating in December, I've been taking the time to consider several different career paths which I may choose to follow in the near future, including climate consultant, scientific researcher and weather forecaster.



# EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION

The EPQ is a qualification worth half an A Level. It involves researching and writing an extended essay on a topic of your choice. With the support of a supervisor, you will produce a project plan, engage in research, produce the essay and deliver a presentation.

Instead of writing an essay, there is also the possibility of producing an “artefact”. This could be a model, a computer program, organising an event, a social enterprise, a film, a script or an artwork. The possibilities are endless.

Doing an EPQ may be a significant advantage when making a UCAS application. Some universities will make it part of the offer, others will lower their offers for applicants who do an EPQ, especially in a related subject. Other universities will regard the EPQ as a tie-breaker, preferring candidates who have done an EPQ over other candidates with similar predicted grades. For those universities which interview applicants, the EPQ could form an important part of the interview.

The EPQ is valued by universities because it develops the skills required for university education. The EPQ is a research-based qualification and universities are research-based institutions. The essay is much longer than an essay in an examination and it will require citations and a bibliography, mirroring the process of a university dissertation. The project requires organisation and planning and is intended to be completed over an extended period of several months, unlike the kind of essay that is generally set for a homework.

The EPQ is excellent evidence of key higher education skills, so you can refer to the project in your UCAS Personal Statement in relation to transferrable skills such as research, critical thinking, teamwork, responding to a challenge, IT

skills, problem solving, organisational skills and time management.

The EPQ can be about any topic. It may be heavily academic or it may be connected to a personal interest outside school. It may be an extension of a school subject or it may link together a number of different subjects. It may or may not relate to a subject you want to study at university. In the past, students have written essays on cricket, Girl Guides, Nordic Noir, skateboarding and Disney princesses. Above all, it should be something you will genuinely enjoy doing.

The important thing to remember is that the EPQ should be the most enjoyable piece of schoolwork you will ever do, because the topic and title are entirely of your choosing. This means that, if you do not enjoy your project you really have no one to blame but yourself.
