






TGS Book Day



TTRockstars Competition

On World Pi Day, we took a team of three students to Sybil Andrews Academy for a trust Mathematics TTRockstars competition.

All students have a TTRockstars account and we recently had a competition to represent TGS in this trust wide competition. Rosy Morelli, Carys Preece and Sasha Preece were the three students who won answering over 160,000 questions between them to represent the school.

On the day we met up with all the other schools in the trust and the competition began, first with a warm up and then into the competition. First, there were heats with all three students making it through to the quarterfinals with Sasha managing an impressive 100% accuracy. Tough competition followed in quarterfinals with Sasha and Rosy making it through to the semi-finals. The final eight became the final four with Sasha narrowly missing out but with













or the February half-term Γ holiday TGS took 30 students for their first school visit to Berlin. As students of German, the pupils were keen to immerse themselves in the language and culture, and to experience life in one of Europe's most dynamic and ever-changing cities. The early start in the pouring rain did little to dampen our spirits as we flew from Stansted to Schoenefeld in Berlin.

We took an introductory walk to Bernauer Strasse, to see the Berlin Wall, and the memorial to those who died trying to escape from East to West. A sombre moment for the pupils to imagine having a wall built right in the middle of a community, and the division which followed.

The next day started with the Brandenburg Gate, followed by a climb up to the top of Germany's parliament building, the Reichstag. The Reichstag has a glass dome, which allowed the pupils to be able to see right across Berlin on what was a cold and frosty day! The history continued in the afternoon with a look at the Topography of Terror, an exhibition which detailed the Nazi history of Berlin, which again gave our pupils a deep insight into the past of this city. We later took a closer look at the story of Berlin's role in the Cold War, before sampling the German Currywurst.

On Sunday we visited the site of the former concentration camp at Sachsenhausen. This showed the graphic horrors of the Nazi regime, and proved to be an emotional experience for our students, who at times found it hard to come to terms with the horrors that took place here. It was a really important experience for a generation of young people who thankfully have never experienced war and conflict, and the way in which they reflected on this visit was a credit to all of them.

A visit to Berlin's Olympic Stadium followed. Monday saw TGS students put their language skills to the test, as we met our guide for the day, Tatiana. A native of the city, Tatiana showed us many of the hidden gems of the city before setting us off on a task to gain information of the history of the city centre by talking to locals. Divided up into teams, the group was given a mission to answer questions on the city by finding out the information in German for themselves. Congratulations went to the team of Briony Crawford, Bethany Ireland-Whittaker, Angel Worley and Celeste Barthropp who got the most correct answers to win the prize!

We also spent a wonderful couple of hours in the DDR Museum, the museum which documented and vividly recreated what life was like in the old East Germany. From an authentic replica of a 1980s East





Berlin apartment, complete with power cuts, vintage propaganda based television shows and both the wardrobes and recipes of the time, to the opportunity for our students to sit behind the wheel of a Trabant, the East German car of choice, the pupils engrossed themselves in what life was like in those times. For our students it really was a whistle stop, breathless tour of the city, with many kilometres walked and much information to take in.

The TGS students were exemplary in their resilience, adaptability and willingness to try new things, and to fully throw themselves into German culture. The reality of this city is that such a short visit barely scratches the surface, and we look forward to a return visit really soon.

Intrepid students and staff boarded the Loach at the TGS bus park for a fun filled week on the slopes of the Austrian Alps. The group travelled to Altenmark, staying at the Hotel Ennstalerhof. With most students having only been on a dry slope for 6 hours it was fantastic to see the progress they made in the first few days and by day 3 all 4 groups were to the top and happily skiing around the mountain. Most of our skiing was done at the resort of Flachau but with 6 days skiing in total we decided to use the coach to go a little further afield and explore Zuachansee. Apres-ski was taken care of by using the swimming pool, snow tubes and cinema room in the hotel and with trips out to the Lucky Flitzer toboggan run and a local swimming pool with the most amazing laser light show. Highlights of the week included: Joe Fitzwater being christened 'Willy Wipeout' as he managed a series of most spectacular crashes (one of which was caught on video); Harry Moule trying to spray me with snow, only

to miss the edge and clatter into my ski boots (also on video); The Lucky Flitzer toboggan ride which Miss Bryan enjoyed so much she forgot to get off; and the 'murder on the slopes' game which really added another edge to the trip. Of all the school ski trips I have run this

Have Your Say: 100% Success!

On 13th March, 12 students took part in the annual Eastern Region Have Your Say foreign languages competition. This has been run by the ALL (Association of language learners) for the past 29 years. The students, Mrs Frid, Mrs Young and Miss Rubio, travelled by minibus to the Colne Community School in Brightlingsea and practised during



the journey. At the event, students were asked to perform age-related tasks. Year 7-9 students had to perform a 10-12 line open ended dialogue, completing the last 4 lines themselves, (guided by Mrs Young and Mrs Frid) whilst the Y10 students had to create a 14 line conversation from scratch, including at least 8 key words from the 10 supplied. All students had to learn their part by heart and perform to a panel of judges and in front of students from many different schools from all over East Anglia.

Students and staff had spent considerable time writing and rehearsing these but the hard work paid off as, for the first year ever, all 12 students secured places in the final round on Wednesday 16th May at Thomas Lord Audley School in Colchester.

This time, they will have to perform their original dialogue plus an additional, unseen

language task suitable for their age range, so they will be continuing to spend time at lunch in the MFL department, rehearsing with Mrs Frid, Mrs Young and Mrs Keys and practising their phonics. Child Sexual Exploitation



Child sexual exploitation (CSE) is a type of sexual abuse.

Children in exploitive situations and relationships receive things such as gifts, money or affection as a result of performing sexual activities or others performing sexual activities on them. Children or young people may be tricked into believing they are in a loving, consensual relationship. They might be invited to parties and given drugs and alcohol. They may also be groomed online. Some children or young people are trafficked into or within the UK for the purpose of sexual exploitation.

Sexual exploitation can also happen to young people in gangs. Child sexual exploitation is a hidden crime. Young people often trust their abuser and don't understand that they're being abused. They may depend on their abuser or be too scared to tell anyone. Over 2,400 children

in the UK were the victims of sexual exploitation in gangs or groups from August 2010 to October 2011.

Other information can be found in Alice's Diary, a very clever resource by Hampshire Police.
The aim of the diary is to raise awareness of the signs of child sexual exploitation and help readers recognise the signs in a friend or family member.

This diary is linked to the

Hampshire Constabulary child sexual exploitation campaign; it is fictional but is based on elements of real examples of child sexual exploitation uncovered by police in the UK.



Our ethos is to work together and bring people together. As a result, our café on Gainsborough Street is a hub of creativity and inclusivity - open to all. Our talented kitchen team produce fresh, delicious snacks, lunches and afternoon teas using locally sourced, Suffolk ingredients. The Bridge Project provides and maintains a series of social activities, a hot meal delivery service and creative workshops for all ages. For local businesses we have meeting rooms for hire and a catering service available if required. Support groups for those living with dementia and their carers are open to CAREFRE residents in Sudbury and the surrounding areas.

So far this year The Bridge Project have accommodated 4 TGS students for work experience.

All the students have thoroughly enjoyed the experience of working there.

Becky Nicholson, manager of The Bridge Project, kindly organises a timetable for the students during their time at the café so that each student has a structured and busy week.

There is always plenty to do and students are given every opportunity to use their IT and creative skills, working with people who have learning disabilities and other needs. The café also provides a food delivery service, delivering food to members of the public (who may require a carer to attend to their needs) and are therefore unable to cook themselves a meal. The café provides a friendly coffee


shop area and food and are served to members






