The theme of the challenge was kept secret until the day, although the fact that the event was partnered with Thorpe Park gave everyone a good idea of what was to come.

The pupils were given the task of planning, designing and presenting an idea for a new attraction at Thorpe Park, given a limited budget and time. Phil, the engineer from IET commented specifically on the high levels of team work and quality of the finished prototypes produced on the day.

Team 6, consisting of Alfie Meech, Max St Ledger, Lauren Martin, Ethan Orme, Emily Mayes and Keira Hall won the event with a design for an aquarium ride and their circuit board prototype which would operate several aspects of the ride. Unfortunately, the team missed out on a place in the national final where teams from around the country compete to have their designs actually made into a new attraction at Thorpe Park and be involved in the design process throughout.

TGS has already signed up for next year's event which will be themed around the space telescope that is due to be designed to replace Hubble.



Tim Coulson, Samuel Ward Academy Trust chief executive, also attended and showed great support for the artists and our partnership with Gainsborough House, remarking on the "outstanding quality of the work."





# Re-Cycle (Bilkes to Africa)

In Britain, millions of bikes lie unused in sheds, whilst many people in Africa have no access to transport of any kind.

Re-Cycle is a bicycle recycling charity, who collects used, donated bikes from the UK and ships them to Africa. People spend hours each day walking to collect water, firewood or to access school or employment. A bicycle lightens this burden and dramatically improves their wellbeing, giving families the extra time to earn, learn and enjoy life.

From their workshop in Colchester, Re-Cycle receives donated bikes and prepares them ready to be put into large containers and shipped to Africa. Last week, Re-Cycle had help from Liam and Otis, two students who spent their work placement learning how to prepare and compact bikes and helping strip wheels for parts.

Without help from the public, Re-Cycle couldn't do what they do. They rely on people's generosity, whether it be by donating their old bikes or by raising money to help fund the charity. They also need daily help from volunteers like Liam and Otis.



- A physical disability
- A long-term physical illness
- A mental health illness
- A dependency on drugs and/or alcohol

It is estimated that there are 1 in 12 young carers of high school

Of course young people who experience this can spend a great deal of time helping at home and this can put them under pressure in other aspects of their lives. Young Carers try to support these students by:

- Giving them an opportunity to meet other young carers, share experiences and support each other - to gain confidence that they are not alone.
- Time with an advisor to discuss their situation and learn new ways of coping.
- Information to help them understand the condition for which they care for.
- Time out from their caring role learn new skills and have some fun - behave like a teenager.
- Provide advocacy support when a voice is needed.

### Mental Health First Aiders

A t Easter last year, the Government announced the launch of a three-year programme of Youth Mental Health First Aid training, with the aim of having one qualified member of staff in each school. Here at TGS, we bid to be included in that first year of training. As a result, we are pleased to announce that in fact we have four members of staff who have now completed this training and are qualified Youth MHFA Champions, with the skills to spot the signs of mental health issues in young people, and guide them to a place of support.

The MHFA Programme is a tried and tested mental health literacy programme that has been running since 2000, and is now an internationally recognised training product that has reached over 2 million people worldwide.

The Youth MHFA training is a preventative programme that supports early intervention, helping to speed up recovery and improve outcomes. It gives key adults in a young person's life the confidence to have those supportive conversations and the knowledge to guide them to either a professional, or self-help supports as appropriate. It recognises that mental health is something that we all have, and that often, early intervention prevents a wellbeing issue from developing into a mental illness. Research demonstrates that early intervention is crucial to promote recovery, support early management of symptoms in a diagnosed mental illness, and ultimately in preventing a wellbeing issue from having a more profound effect on a young person's life. The courses promote wellbeing and self-care techniques so that young people can be helped to develop skills to manage their own wellbeing.

The training is not designed to teach school staff how to be therapists, counsellors or psychiatrists, and it does not teach staff how to diagnose mental health conditions. The role of the Youth Mental Health First Aider is to act as a point of contact and reassurance for a young person who may be experiencing a wellbeing issue, a mental illness, or emotional distress. The input could range from having a supportive conversation, signposting the young person to professional help, for example via the school nurse or GP, or guiding them to appropriate self-help resources.

## Qualified Mental Health First Aiders

Here at Thomas Gainsborough School, we take mental health and wellbeing very seriously.

We have four members of staff who are trained Mental Health First Aiders.

After this presentation, we were allowed to enter any of the five courtrooms to listen to the various hearings, so that we could experience the different branches of law to suit our tastes.
























