
On Thursdays (starting 5th March) there will be a Jazz Club where students can focus on performance pieces from genres such as Musical Theatre, Commercial and Street.



Year 9 Linguists

n Tuesday 14th January ten Year 9 linguists travelled to the University of Cambridge for an MFL event focusing on the benefits of continuing the study of a language to GCSE level and beyond. Also at the event were four Language Ambassadors who were all in their first or second years at the university and they were able to answer lots of questions from students ranging from what it's like to study a language to degree level to what sort of societies (clubs) can be joined and what the student accomodation is like. SILK FACTORY VISIT

s part of their GCSE coursework the Year 10 textile students have been learning about fabric construction. To see this process in practice I arranged to take them to Stephen Walters & Sons on Cornard Road, Sudbury for a guided tour of the factory.

The silk factory is celebrating its 300 year anniversary this year and specialises in Jacquard woven innovative fabrics.

This visit gave the students the rare opportunity to see the industry in its entirety including the logistical elements that go into the running of a successful thriving business, as all aspects of the company are run from the same site. This includes the initial client meeting, to the design stage, then on to the final woven outcome and finally on to shipping.

I would like to say thank you to the students for their outstanding behaviour and engagement in the visit and to the wonderful staff at Stephen Walters for their time.'

'At the end of last term, our GCSE Textiles class had the opportunity to visit the Stephen Walters Silk Mill in Sudbury. Many of us had not been inside the building or delved into the culture and heritage of the silk industry, and on reflection I think it was an extremely useful trip regarding the course we are doing, to soak up as much of the Textile industry, different products and techniques as possible.

After walking to the mill, we were met by friendly staff who took us first to a room where, laid out on the centre table, were examples of archive designs and, lining the wall, stacks of previous design samples and releases of their previous designs. They outlined the history of how the silk industry had progressed. It was really interesting to see the difference between the old books, which had fine, intricate, often floral patterns, compared to the modern pieces which pushed boundaries on colour and imagination, pulled off with immaculate execution.

Following this we took a tour of the mill. Our tour guides were very kind and were interactive, responding enthusiastically to any questions we had whilst going around the mill. We visited the design office, which was certainly a hub for creativity. It was interesting to see how they designed the new patterns on computers compared to how they would have done previously. We also visited the account and marketing offices which was nice because it showed the range in job skills required at the mill. We also visited a room where they packaged the silk and handled the deliveries. The tour also took us to the inspection shed (where they looked through the silk for any mistakes), the warehouse, where they had reams and reams of product and the silk thread ready to be used. Lastly, they took us to the weaving shed. It was very loud in there and we had to wear ear protection. It was also surprising how many and how big the weaving machines were. It was so interesting to see so many colours and patterns emerging each second on newly woven fabrics and how the machines work in terms of the warp and weft.

Overall, I think we can say on behalf of the whole class, the trip was extremely beneficial and enjoyable and we cannot thank the kind staff at the mill enough for giving us this opportunity. It was insightful to delve into another niche of the textile industry and we all found it very interesting!'

YEAR 8 VISIT ST Andrew's Church For their Arts Award

ear 8 have been busy this year completing art work in and out of their lessons towards their Arts Award; this is awarded by the Crafts Council England and is a nationally recognised qualification in the arts.

The award is split into four distinctive parts and for 'Part C' the students have been studying the artist John Piper, whose work consists of architectural religious buildings in mixed media with an expressive use of marks and lines. To further enhance their understanding of his work for 'Part A' the whole of Year 8 have visited our local Church, St Andrew's within their Art lesson.

Led by one of our chaplains, Ian, the students learn a little bit of history about the church before recording
