Goodbye Houghton we looking forward to seeing you all in the term.



### River Stour Trip (Minibus Wednesdays)

n the 21st of June, 8 students and 2 fabulous teachers, Mrs Young and Miss Hilson, all went to the lock at Great Cornard. When we arrived, we were greeted by the captain of the boat and given vibrant orange life jackets and then got in a boat called "The Edwardian Lady".

We had to wait for the trustees to make the water in the lock the same level as the river and the gates were soon opened. We then set off on our journey. We were very lucky as it was beautiful weather and there were lots of bright blue damselflies and dragonflies flying amongst the vellow water lilies and landing on the boat.

We were all given a sheet of things to look out for and tick off and we spotted lots of swans, ducks and moorhens. There were millions of tiny fish swimming below us in the clear water and some larger ones nearer the river bed. We had to turn around at the Henny Swan pub. The captain told us stories about what the river used to be like and what it was used for. Lighters used to be pulled by horse and transported bricks from Sudbury to London (they were used at Liverpool Street and St Pancras train stations) and then brought horse manure back from the streets of London.

On the way, he pointed out some highly dangerous giant hogweed which is poisonous and could give you massive blisters, needing hospital treatment. We thought it looked like cow parsley but bigger. If you see any you should report it to the environment agency. When we got back we were dropped off near the lock so that we were able to work it. First the boat had to enter the lock then we closed the gates. We had to open some slits to let the water rise so the captain could get out. We waited until the water in the lock was at the same level at the river and opened the gates at the other end of the lock so that the boat could moor nearby.

Afterwards, realising we had some spare time, Miss Hilson came up with the idea of geocaching. We walked sensibly to St Andrew's church to look for the hidden little pot. Geocaching is where you follow internet clues and you look for small containers which have a reel of paper inside and when you find it you sign the paper and replace it. We were stuck for ages as it was very hard to find when all of a sudden a man came up, felt behind a post and revealed a tiny cylinder no bigger than a centimetre cubed. Everyone was surprised how easily he found it as we searched for ages!

We thoroughly enjoyed the trip and hope there will be many more trips like this one.

# Geography


On a really hot and sunny day in May Year 8 Geographers visited Felixstowe for the annual coastal field trip.

The event was supported by the Ogden Trust, a Cambridge-based charitable trust that exists to promote the teaching and learning of physics.



# Technology


**√**ear 8 STEM students ■ have been extending their creativity using our contemporary laser cutter. This modern equipment speeds up manufacturing, so projects can be realised quicker and prototyping can be thoroughly investigated. Prototyping allows designers to take risks and push inventiveness, which are qualities we at TGS are striving to instil into our STEM students.

The laser cutter has a 0.1mm accuracy, which combined with our computer design programs mean that the students can create extremely precise structures. Mimi Mills created this structure to support a mobile phone incorporating a headphone holder.

n the 29th of June, Thomas Tullin, Rebekah White and Megan Hermon from Year 7 travelled to Santapod Raceway in Northamptonshire. They were taking part in the national final of the Bloodhound SSC race for the line competition.

Having won both their local and regional finals outright, the team had made it through to the nationals, where they had to design and build a scale model rocket car from a strict brief and over a tight time scale. The cars then had small rocket motors fitted to them and were raced using some of the world record rules that Bloodhound SSC will hopefully face next year, when it attempts to break the land speed record and a 1000mph in the South African desert.

The competition was extremely tight and no bending of the rules was allowed whatsoever with three teams being disqualified from racing due to design infringements. Sadly, the team were not able to replicate their previous success and came 18th out of 30 cars. Even though the team left disappointed not

to win, as national finalists the name of the school will be on the tail fin of the actual Bloodhound car and that is a real achievement.

# Let's Get Digital!

Digital Literacy & Citizenship Award Released

A program of study to recognise students' digital literacy and citizenship has been unveiled. Students will be introduced to the new award, which will contribute to their record of achievement when they graduate from Thomas Gainsborough School in Year 11.

An electronic portfolio assessment tool has been designed in-house, where students collate examples of work that highlight safe, responsible and appropriate use of IT tools and resources.

The award recognises four topic areas:

- Using the WWW and web etiquette
- Producing business documentation
- Demonstrating awareness of health, safety and well-being in a digital climate
- Producing a business presentation



Students will work on activities through tutor time, enrichment days, activities in IT and their own evidence conducted outside of school to build a portfolio to recognise their achievement. Awards will be presented to Bronze, Silver and Gold standard as well as a ribbon on their record of achievement to recognise this accolade.

The benefits are profound and will endeavour to develop responsible citizens who are aware of their digital footprint and its impact, ensuring safe and responsible use of technology.

The Careers Hub recorded **▲** 1290 visits by lower students since 15th May. Every time the students visit Careers to place achievements in record of achievement folders, attend employer workshops, Career guidance interviews or just to use our resources and Chrome books. we ask them to sign in.

On 18th May Sixth Form students Ricky Reader and Haydon Willis went to 'Age UK' in Sudbury. During their visit they interviewed Jilly Vince and a number of residents, in order to make a video for a future careers enrichment day activity, on the subject of dementia for Year 8 students.

As part of the Sixth Form induction day, on the 28th June, prospective Sixth Form students spent a lesson in the department, taking part in a careers quiz and listening to a careers induction talk. We are keen to encourage students to make the most of every opportunity to network with employers and to learn all important employability skills.



On 30th June a variety of West Suffolk Hospital employees came to the school to speak to students' regarding a career within the

NHS and healthcare profession. Students were fortunate enough to hear presentations from a surgical nurse, occupational therapist, physiotherapist and a midwife. This NHS employer workshop proved to be an invaluable experience for all those considering healthcare or medicine as a career. We have already booked a number of employers to visit in September including the Air Training Cadets, a beauty therapist, West Suffolk Hospital volunteering, Suffolk apprenticeships workshop, an apprenticeship talk with Shannon Smith and an alumni guest to talk about successful apprenticeship routes.

The last week of June saw Health and Social care Sixth form students complete their 100 hours of work experience. Many thanks go to Age UK, Hillside Special School, Number 72, Mrs Canham in Access, Catchpole Court, St Gregory's Primary School, West Suffolk Hospital and Waldingfield Primary School for their continued support this year.

The start of the new academic vear will see the launch of the Half Colours programme for students in Year 7 and 8. This is to celebrate achievements of our students during their first two years of Thomas Gainsborough School. The Half Colours award will be based on the same framework as the graduation ribbons. Our aim is to encourage students to get into the habit of visiting careers with documentation of their achievements, both in and out of school. Students will receive a stamp for each achievement and the students will be awarded a Half Colour award sticker once all stamps have been accumulated.

During English and IT lessons, students in year 9 have been working on their CV's and cover letters in preparation for mock interviews, that will take place when they move up to year 10. Currently they are in the process of visiting the careers department to file work and evidence in their Record Of Achievement folders.

On Enrichment day July 6th students in Year 9 listened to a presentation, and took part in follow up activities regarding health and safety in the workplace. They will receive a certificate to place in their ROA folders. This is in preparation for work experience in Year 10.

The Careers team invited local colleges, Apprenticeships Suffolk, YMCA Training, a representative from the RAF and ICANBEA careers information website to Thomas Gainsborough School. They provided post 16 information and networking opportunities for student's in Year 10 in preparation for making further education and training choices later this year.
