The students gave an insightful review, generating great ideas for the web design team to take away and incorporate. We look forward to reviewing the site once it has been developed.

Preparing Young People for the World of Work TGS Students Join Business Leaders to Launch the New Enterprise Adviser Venture to Inspire and Prepare Young People for the World of Work

A new programme which aims to link local senior business people with Headteachers and Principals was launched at Thetford Academy in February.

The event was attended by more than 60 Head teachers, Principals, Assistant Heads & Vice Principals, students, Local Authority Staff and senior business leaders.

The New Anglia Enterprise Adviser Network is a national programme being delivered locally that connects local business leaders with senior leaders in local secondary schools, academies, colleges, helping to motivate and inspire young people's career aspirations, to make a major impact on their work prospects.

Speakers at the launch event also included Mary Tyler, Programme Director, The Careers and Enterprise Company, business leaders Richard Bridgman, Warren Services and Clive Edmonds of Scienta Consulting and students from the Thomas Gainsborough School, Suffolk and the Thetford Academy, Norfolk, who are learning about careers and enterprise through a range of activities.

PSHE Enrichment Day

Wednesday 9th March was another brilliant and vibrant day when we were delighted to welcome members of our local community into school to share their experiences and knowledge to enrich our students' learning. The theme of the day was choices, equality and diversity – celebrating difference and challenging intolerance.

Year 7 and 8 students eagerly debated the European Migrant Crisis and explored and challenged some commonly held myths when looking at the threat of terrorism.

Year 9 and 10 students looked at the threat of terrorism too and discussed the Government's 'Prevent Strategy'. They also focussed on relationships and were fortunate to share, and question, the experiences of 'Explore' ambassadors, real life married couples, as well as meeting Joseph an ambassador from Stonewall.

Budding forensic scientists, in Year 7, investigated an imaginary break in at Thomas Gainsborough School and the suspicious death of our unfortunate caretaker. (Editor's note: We have to say they are all looking particularly well after the day!) Using some sophisticated scientific techniques they were successful in identifying the culprit.

Year 8 students skilfully questioned a number of employers in a speed networking event finding out about future careers and employability skills.




















Healthwatch

Healthwatch Suffolk is working with TGS to find out what young people think of current health care for children and young people in Suffolk. On the Enrichment Day on 1st December Healthwatch gathered the views of 600 students from all year groups.

Healthwatch and Unity & Diversity also engaged in debates with 65 students in Year 10 and 11 in their Health and Social Care lessons. Students discussed and analysed the collected data on 19th January. They found that the main areas of concern for young people are Mental Health and Sexual Health. Their discussions on these areas and the more generic concern of accessing health care provision were noted by Healthwatch Suffolk and their partners Unity in Diversity who prepared a script for a series of four short plays. Our talented Year 8 and Year 9 Drama students, over the next few weeks, took part in Drama Workshops with a professional actor from Unity in Diversity.

On Tuesday 22nd March these students will perform the plays at a Showcase Evening Event. Offshoot Films has recorded this innovative project; their film will be shown at the Showcase Event. Representatives from Health and Social Care providers in Suffolk and members of Suffolk County Council attended in order to learn from our students. The feedback in its many guises will inform Public Health Suffolk County Council's Children and Young People's initiatives.

British Schools Karting

Thomas Gainsborough School sent two teams of Karters to the preliminary round of this year's British Schools Karting Competition on February 3rd. The two teams travelled to Anglia Indoor Karting circuit in Ipswich to race against pupils from other schools in East Anglia in the Local final. The students made up two teams of three with each driver racing in two sprint races; the points then contributed towards a team total. As always, the field was very competitive this year with several very experienced returning teams including Farlingaye High School and Kesgrave High School. TGS A came second overall, narrowly missing the top position due to an incident in the last race. TGS B raced consistently and came 8th overall. Ben Tatum and Josh Martin of TGS A were both novices to competitive racing. 'It felt like forever waiting for the green light at the start of the first race,' said Josh Martin.



'Both new drivers performed exceptionally, you wouldn't have known they hadn't raced in competitions before and were not fazed by the seasoned veterans they were competing against,' said Mr Cameron, the teams' organiser. Ben and Josh both earned important points for their team, making up several places over their two races apiece. Josh Addison made the third member of TGS A, winning his first race and lapping all but the Karter in second place. TGS B comprised of Tom Davey, Olly Marshall and Charlie Fletcher. In coming second TGS A team has advanced to the next stage of the competition, the regional final held at Daytona in Milton Keynes on April 26th.




UK Linguist Olympiad
















Year II Celebration Opportunities



Taylor Mann's report:

Year 12 Media students from Thomas Gainsborough School have produced a BBC school report. They have compiled a radio station report on James Cartlidge's petition to increase mobile phone reception in Suffolk. They interviewed Mr Cartlidge and a Vodaphone representative. They asked some really tackling questions which Mr Cartlidge and the Vodaphone employee responded to. The group of students had help from Jo Mathys a reporter from BBC Radio 4. She showed the students some of her colleagues' work; the students were intrigued to see how their reports had been presented.

Their first lesson was about what they could ask Mr Cartlidge; they came up with some very interesting questions which would engage Mr Cartlidge. In the second lesson two of the students interviewed Mr Cartlidge. The report was then recorded by other students from the group. In the third lesson one of the students interviewed Vodaphone, who gave them a lot of interesting facts and figures about the company. They then crafted and edited their interviews with the software on the Media Studies computer.

Overall the day was a success: all the students loved it, they learnt a lot from the day and they said they would love a day like it again.

Holmes and Hill essay prize

London Docklands visit



On Thursday 4th February the A-Level Geography students took part in a field trip to London's Docklands. After conducting questionnaires in Stratford we headed for London's financial district where Canary Wharf is situated. Here we visited the London Docklands Museum where we mainly researched about the London Docklands Development Corporation (LDDC). This was very interesting as it helped to cement our knowledge, and gave us a recent case study of urban decline. After the visit to the museum we walked to the Emirates Air Line (while taking lots of pictures on the way!) but on the way we noticed that in front of Canary Wharf would make a good photo - so that's what we did!
