MY SNOWDON ADVENTURE

y name is Luke and I am in Year 7. When I was 9 years old I was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes. This means my pancreas doesn't make insulin and I have to inject insulin to keep me healthy and alive.

When I was told I had diabetes I felt worried because I had never heard of it and didn't know anybody that had it. My friends in primary school helped me so much and learned all they could about diabetes, but I still felt a little bit different because they didn't have diabetes themselves.

My nurse at the hospital told me about a special adventure weekend, just for children with diabetes. It sounded so much fun! So I went! I did kayaking, raft building and lots of other things with other diabetic children. But most importantly I met other children like me! I made so many new friends and felt normal again.

The weekend was organised by the East of England Child and Yong People Diabetes Network. They organise and bring together children and families from all over East Anglia. They also do things like ice skating, summer games and wilderness days. They even have a football team!

When we heard about a fundraising event they were doing we decided our family would love to join in. It would be a huge challenge because we were climbing Mount Snowdon in Wales! It is 1085m high and very difficult to climb. We had to do lots of training and went on lots of long dog walks. Then it was cancelled because of Covid so when heard we could do it this year we had to train even harder!

On Saturday 26th June we met with other families, nurses and doctors to hike up Mount Snowdon. It was really hard at the beginnig because it was so steep! I wasn't sure if I could do it but kept going. It took us 3 and a half hours to get to the top and

the views were amazing! It was sunny the whole time we were climbing but when we got to the top it was cloudy. Then after a break we walked back down again. That took a bit longer than going up but I think it was easier coming down. I had to make sure my blood sugar levels didn't go too low which was challenging, but it was alright in the end. This was the biggest challenge I have faced so far and I was so proud that I did it!

In total my family raised over £700 for the Network, and we raised more than £7.5k between everybody climbing. This will mean that the network can help so many more children with diabetes and their families.

I had so much fun climbing Snowdon that I have decided to climb Scafell Pike next year, and Ben Nevis the year after. I hope my family want to come, too!

Year 9 – Intimate & Sexual Relationships and Health & Safety


Year 10 – Relationship & Sex Education: Being Safe and Intimate & Sexual Relationships


Co-Curricular clubs offer students an extension to their lessons, in order to support their progress, coursework and exam practice.








STUDENTS EXPERIENCE VIRTUAL ART WORKSHOPS

∧ n exciting opportunity has arisen for **A**our Year 10 to 13 students to attend free after school online art based workshops in conjunction with the University College London (UCL) and STORE, London. Here, two Year 13 students tell of their experiences so

We were introduced to the STORE "After School Club" workshops after Miss Bowman had received an invitation from the people who run them in London. There are workshops that include art, photography, 3D modelling, and much more, and run online on weekday evenings. It's a great opportunity as it allows for learning new techniques that we often don't have access to either because of a lack of funding or inaccessibility by being in the countryside. They are free and they even send equipment and tools that you need for the course through the post!

Myself and Milly first attended the "Animal Tracks" workshop run on Tuesday 18th May where we experimented with a Japanese marbling technique called Suminagashi where you place ink on top of water, and it creates a tree ring like pattern. It's fun to learn new techniques that we'd never learn unless we discovered them ourselves and it's interesting to see people in the actual industry and what they do. We then attended another digital workshop run by RANDOM HAPPINESS who are based in Barcelona, on how Google Street View can be used in art. It's fascinating to see how Street View can be used for different purposes and open up so many avenues. We are also planning to do their first in-person workshop in over a year in London, where we learn about sustainable fashion and techniques used in it, such as crochet. It's run by fashion designer Liam Hodges, and while it's expensive to have to travel to London, the skills and inspiration make it worth it. They're supported by UCL and you can sign up for their future workshops through the website where you email them.





The first class is the Animal Tracks and Weather Maps, where we have been mastering the technique of Japanese suminagashi printing, where the printing supplies are provided! We have learned about animal tracking and engaging with nature to enhance these prints too. On Thursdays, we have been participating in another course, Digital Promenade, with RANDOM HAPPINESS. We have been digitally travelling through Barcelona, embracing the culture and creating abstract work from Google Street View. Our next set of classes is in London with design studio Liam Hodges, working to create a collection of sustainable fashion accessories, which we are very excited about! 'Sudbury as our canvas' is returning to Sudbury in July to bring some colour and positivity from the young people of the town to the shopfronts and business of the town.





TGS shortlisted for prestigious national award

Thomas Gainsborough School has been honoured for its commitment to creative learning and the arts by being shortlisted for the most prestigious education awards this summer.

The Times Educational Supplement (TES) education awards are the most widely recognised awards for excellence in the teaching world, and this year TGS has been shortlisted for the 'Creative school of the year' category, with an application based upon the work we have undertaken over the last year on cultural touchstones in tutor groups (which we have also shared with other schools) and the partnerships we have employed with Historic England, the Protein databank and the Human Cell Atlas.

The award was given to the Chorlton High School in Manchester, in recognition of the work they have done to highlight the journeys and plight of refugees fleeing danger in other countries. Being shortlisted for this award is an extraordinary honour, having been selected over hundreds of other deserving candidates and we are extremely proud to have been recognised in this way by the selection panel at TES.

TGS STUDENTS RECIEVE EXCELLENCE AWARDS FOR CARD GAME DESIGN

The Human Cell Atlas game design project

The human cell atlas is a science group based ▲ in Cambridge whose mission is to map every cell in the human body and understand how they work and what they do. The end result would be essentially a 'Google maps' of the human body, which will enable scientists to analyse every affliction that affects us and more effectively develop treatments. The group is widely considered to be the premiere group working in the field, and at the cutting edge of cellular research. This Spring, While TGS did not win the first place award, which the Human Cell Atlas ran a project with schools called the 'how to build a human' game design project with students in Key Stage Three. This project was designed to give schools the chance to design a card game which explained through play the objectives of the Human Cell Atlas and the types of cells they research and map. This could be completed by students individually or in groups.

Mr Few and Mrs Spinks have designed a short project for students in the Design classes, with an introduction created by Mrs Palmer. Mr Few created a series of outstanding resources which combined the resources and information provided by the Human Cell Atlas with a series of tasks, information on the design principles of card


games and example images of both the work of the HCA and other card games. Mr Few's work has been shared with the public engagement team at the Human Cell Atlas, who have been extremely impressed by the way he has converted their materials into a sequence of lessons with clear success criteria and examples of similar games, along with analysis and evaluation prompts.


























TGS HIGHLIGHTED BY EUROPEAN EDUCATION JOURNAL:

'Science in schools' article on the Protein Art project highlights the work of students in STEM groups

or the second year, TGS has taken part in the L''Protein Art Project' in partnership with the Protein databank of Europe to create pieces of art based upon the unique protein structures of different species. Given the restrictions in place, this time around students, in KS3 STEM groups have developed a digital portfolio of work in which they have researched the work of the protein databank of Europe, other artists who have worked in the field of microbiology based art, selected a protein number from the databank, created a series of designs and a final outcome and then wrote a statement for the competition. These portfolios, along with images of the final pieces, have then been submitted digitally to the Protein data bank for entry in the exhibition of work. Alongside this, the work of last year's students, which could not be exhibited physically will have its own mini exhibition as part of 'Sudbury as our canvas'.

TGS' work to scale up its participation in the Protein Art project has impressed the project managers at PDBE, and they have highlighted it in an article they have published in the European Journal of Science Education, 'Science in Schools.' The article 'Introducing students to the beauty of biomolecules' is written by Dr Deepti Gupta and Dr David Armstrong. The article opens by explaining the work of the group and the objective of the Protein Art Project:

The PDB Art project is run by Protein Data Bank in Europe (PDBe), which is jointly responsible for managing the Protein Data Bank (PDB) archive, a database containing 3D atomic structures for more than 175 000 biomolecules. These structures are crucial for scientists looking for answers to important biological and biomedical questions, for example, relating to disease, metabolism, and developing new drugs. Through the PDB Art project, students are introduced to the importance of biomolecules such as proteins and DNA, and how these can be visualised in 3D. The aim is to spark their curiosity and inspire them to learn more about a molecule of interest, for example a protein linked to a disease. After learning more about the protein, they are encouraged to

create artworks that illustrate the molecule and explain 'why it matters'. These artworks are then shared widely by PDBe in the public and scientific community through exhibitions and other media, such as a yearly calendar.

When referencing TGS, the article continues: The project, which started with just a single student, now covers eight schools, including Thomas Gainsborough School (TGS) in Sudbury, UK. Teachers from TGS have used the project to foster a deeper collaboration between the science and art departments. The active-learning strategies employed throughout the project enable teachers to introduce their students to complex scientific topics in accessible ways. Students were really enthused by this approach to scientific learning, and many were surprised by how valuable it was to combine these subjects in new ways. Students were encouraged to be creative about how they developed the artworks depicting their scientific topics, which challenged them to fully understand the science behind their chosen protein. One of them said, "Although it wasn't hard to come up with scientific ideas and concepts, it was harder to incorporate them into a piece of art." The cross-curricular nature of the project helps the students gain interest and confidence in both science and arts. The blend of scientific learning and creative expression provides a unique opportunity for students to explore societal issues through a scientific lens, giving them options to explore future career opportunities. TGS implemented the project broadly, with students aged 12 to 17 years participating at various levels. Dedicated lessons introduced students to molecular structures in the PDB and the basic scientific concepts of proteins and amino acids, using resources provided by PDBe, 3D modelling kits, and activities. Later, the students were reintroduced to molecular structures in art lessons using additional resources from PDBe like a 3D visualisation tool and previous year's artworks in the PDBe calendar. The students were then encouraged to research a protein of their choice before creating artworks depicting the protein and written descriptions about how their artwork relates to the protein and the world around us. For older and more advanced students, TGS ran a more free-form version of the project, with more focus on independent learning outside of lessons and during extracurricular sessions. This allowed students more time to explore and research the scientific topics, thus resulting in deeper interpretations of proteins in their final artworks.

Once again we have been extremely proud of the work our students have produced, and the recognition we have received for delivering the project with such a large group of students in a comprehensive setting. We look forward to coming up with new and innovative ways of approaching the project again next year.



















TECHNOLOGY


From Bauhaus to pop art, Year 8 have been having the time of their lives designing and making clocks inspired by their chosen design movement. In September the technology department invested in its second laser cutter meaning every student in KS3 now will have the opportunity to learn CAD and CAM, skills that will enhance the knowledge of engineering design principles, linking numeracy, computer skills, and good communication skills. Using the brief of creating a clock inspired by their chosen design movement 8G/tk2 have been busy this term researching, creating moodboards, designing and consulting. They have gained knowledge and understanding of Computer Aided Design and Computer Aided Manufacture.


As you can see, they are all very proud of the clocks they have produced.











Dractical engineers have been focusing on the **I** engineering of the Solar Orbiter. The Solar Orbiter mission aims to produce images of the Sun and perform detailed measurements of the Sun's properties.

Week 1: Each student had to design, make, test and evaluate an appropriate heat shield to protect a square of chocolate from a heat source. In this instance the chocolate represents the payload of important equipment and tools on the solar orbiter and the heat source represents the sun.

Week 2: The solar wind is a rapid expansion of the Sun's outer atmosphere, producing gusty flows with speeds of between 200km/s to 800 km/s means the orbiter needs to protect its cargo from impact. Limiting the students to 3 materials of their choice they had to design and make a protective capsule for an egg. To test the impact protection the capsule enclosed eggs were dropped from the 3rd floor.

This term in careers Mrs Osborne has ■ met with over 60 Year 10 students to discuss their post 16 options and have recorded a video to share with parents and students about future pathways. We will be running further events next term to ensure our current Year 10s are aware of all their options after they complete their GCSEs in Year 11. Open day dates for colleges and 6th forms will be shared as soon as they are available to us.

We would encourage students that are moving into Year 11 to arrange a 1:1 careers guidance session with Mrs Osborne (Level 6 Qualified in Careers Guidance and Advice) from September as they will need to apply to college or 6th form by Christmas 2021. Even if students are sure of what they want to do next it is always good to have a back up plan thought out and to check that your understanding about certain choices are correct and unbiased.

We are delighted to announce that 86 of our current Year 11 students have been awarded full ribbons which is truly impressive considering the challenging couple of years they have had. You will find the criteria for the full ribbons in your child's planner along with other useful career related information regarding half ribbons for lower years 7-9 and an explanation of Skills Builder which will be introduced to students next year.

Skills Builder is a national organisation that helps individuals at all stages of their education and beyond to develop the 8 essential skills needed for any area of work or life in general namely; listening, speaking, problem solving, creativity, staying positive, aiming high, leadership and teamwork. This term we started

an after school club on a Tuesday that any student can join to help them develop these skills through fun interactive activities. Next term 6th formers will also be able to develop these essential skills during a wednesday afternoon enrichment class.

Next year we will be launching a new careers education platform called Morrisby to help students explore areas of work suited to their interests and skills and understand what qualifications and requirements are needed for those roles so they can plan ahead. Our 6th Form will also be able to use Morrisby to explore University or Apprenticeship routes, track their progress and undertake careers related tasks set for them by myself and members of the 6th Form team. We are very excited about the role this sophisticated and comprehensive system will have in introducing a range of opportunities to students, encouraging them to look more broadly at their future options.

As the Careers Hub is located in the 6th Form building Mrs Osborne has been spending Tuesday and Thursday lunchtimes over in the main building to ensure her advice and guidance is also accessible to the main school. Promotional videos of higher education colleges and our own 6th form are now running on our internal TV screens around the school so students can get an idea of what further education post 16 might look like for

For the lower school, Year 9s during enrichment days have learnt about Health and Safety in the workplace, professional communication and created their first CV and covering letter ready for the mock interviews with an employer later in the year.

This term we have had some employers speak to our 6th Form students about careers in

IT, sport and town planning and hope to get our lunchtime employer workshops up and running again next academic year which will give all years a chance to meet with a variety of different employers during their lunch break. We have also had an ex student (Alexander James) speak to Year 12 students about his experience on an IT Apprenticeship at Penna in Manchester. Students really appreciated hearing from the horse's mouth what it has been like for Alex over the last year and how he went about looking for this great opportunity.

We continue to update and review information on the careers page of the school website and issue our careers weekly newsletter full of virtual work experience opportunities,

inspirational speakers, open day information and more.



Vear 12 geographers were back outside completing I 4 days of fieldwork to develop the skills for their non-examined assessment worth 20% of their A level as well as working on concepts and ideas studied so far.

Students visited Bradfield Woods to complete transects and sampling of different areas and species to measure the carbon capture by the woodland while Felixstowe was visited to complete assessments of both coastal erosion and flood risk.

Students spent a day measuring and calculating infiltration rates on different land uses as well as investigating whether soil compaction, relief of the land and soil moisture affected these rates. Finally, a day investigating the impact that COVID has had on Sudbury as a retail centre was completed with interviews at a safe distance with the public.

We always say we can write a reference on students after 4 days of fieldwork not just on their geography and students showed an abundance of soft skills and employability skills whether independent learning, team work, organisation, leadership and resilience when interviewing people in the street might not be your thing!

Year 12 were excellent and are now deciding what they will investigate as their independent research for their NEA over the summer. For some it will be local for others places further afield will be used.

The outdoors is a great classroom. It was great to share it with this group and to feel some normality returning to what we can do after this difficult time.
